TEIERISTIÍÁKTHA BORDER CROSSING

On January 23, 2007, the United States and other countries insisted that all visitors arriving in their country by air or sea required a Passport. For Kahnawakehro:non, that meant that either a Canadian or American Passport had to be used to fly between countries. Additionally, in January 2008, passports will be required to cross the border by land.



(Currently, flying within the United States without a passport is acceptable – such as flying between Burlington to Florida.)

The MCK has been trying to work with other First Nations representatives to find an alternative to Canadian or American Passports. No alternatives have materialized as of yet. The MCK is currently hoping that the Traditional bodies as well as the Band Councils of the Iroquois Confederacy can work together to find a solution for all.

KANÁ:TA AIONTATERIHWANÓNTONSE COMMUNITY CONSULTATION

Community Consultation is becoming more and more of an imperative need for the Mohawk Council of Kahnawá:ke (MCK).

In the past, major issues such as the Membership Law would include community consultation. Other Mohawk Laws, major policies and negotiations with governments would usually be decided at the Council Table by the elected Chiefs. However, times are changing. Not only is the Community demanding more input, the MCK is also hoping for the same. Therefore, it was recently announced that the MCK would be embarking upon an ambitious series of community consultations, with a plan to utilize new and creative methods of communication between the chiefs and the people.

In 2006, several initiatives pointed in this direction. A Focus Group was held to create a Community Survey on Council Priorities. An independent group led by Dr. Gerald Taiaiake Alfred ran a consultation process on the Seigneurie of Sault St. Louis land claim. Also introduced, was a new way to develop

Communal Laws, with direct input from Community Members. Finally, the Lands Unit ran consultations to create the Clean Soil and Commercial Land Use policies. The new Legislative Process is expected to be implemented this year.

Look for more Community Surveys, Focus Groups and different Consultation models in the near future.

WHAT IS MSI?

MSI stands for Mohawk Self Insurance, which is a program offered through the Social Development Unit of the MCK.

Its goal is to provide a better quality of life for Mohawks of Kahnawá:ke by ensuring that all entrepreneurs have proper insurance coverage for their employees in the event of an on-the-job accident resulting in injury.

HOW DOES MSI WORK?

- Mohawk Self Insurance is a replacement for Quebec's Workman's Compensation, commonly known as CSST.
- MSI provides comparable coverage to CSST, such as weekly income replacement indemnity should an employee not be able to work due to an on-the-job injury.
- In many cases, MSI exceeds the benefits and services that CSST provides.
- With MSI, every case file is individually examined and processed according to the unique circumstances of each situation.

Seigneurie Process Update


The current Seigneurie Negotiation Process, which was slated to end in December 2006, has been extended. In January, the MCK announced that negotiations have been extended until December 2007. This will allow both parties to continue working on settling this outstanding grievance.

Consultation

The MCK will be consulting with the community on the Seigneurie, which has been identified as a priority by Chief and Council. Community input is an important part of the current Seigneurie process and Kahnawakehrónon are being urged to participate. Like the first phase of consultations on the Seigneurie that took place last year, the upcoming round of consultations will be carried out by a third party, working independently of the MCK. This phase is expected to be more inclusive and extensive, with the start date to be announced in the very near future.

New Seigneurie Coordinator

The Seigneurie of Sault St. Louis Team underwent a change in management this year. In December of 2006, the coordinator of the file, Frank Vieni, officially retired after more than 13 years of service here at the Mohawk Council of Kahnawá:ke (MCK). Dennis Diabo has taken over as coordinator, and continues to work with the rest of the Seigneurie Team.



Dennis brings several years of experience with him, having worked within various departments of the MCK, including the Lands Unit and the Office of the Council of Chiefs. Before coming over to the MCK in 2001, Dennis worked within the department of Indian Affairs and with more than 60 First Nations Communities across Canada, including Quebec, Ontario and the Northwest Territories.

HOW DO I GET MSI?

If you are presently in a work situation with no on-the-job insurance coverage, talk to your employer about the advantages of providing MSI for the life blood of their company, you the employee. If you can't work due to injury and you have no coverage, paying your bills and providing for your family will be an overwhelming challenge.

WHAT DOES MSI PROVIDE?

- Mohawk Self Insurance pays 75% of your gross salary before deductions. (CSST pays 90% of your net salary after all deductions including taxes).
- With MSI all medical expenses are paid.
- MSI will cover re-training for a new career should the need arise.
- An annuity in the case of death is also paid. Even the employee's children receive survivor benefits.
- Funeral expenses of up to \$3500 will also be provided.

OHWĪSTA TEWA NIKÓN RARE BUDGET

The Mohawk Council of Kahnawake finalized its 2007/2008 fiscal budget on Wednesday, March 28 at a special Council Meeting. The fiscal year runs from April 1, 2007 to March 31, 2008. Note: This is the third year of a five year Financial Arrangement with Canada, whom the majority of funding comes from.

Path of a typical MCK Budget

- Unit Directors submit budget requests on February 6, 2007. Primary budgets represent current needs. Secondary requests are additional needs.
- The Finance Unit, Executive Director and Associate Executive Directors review the budgets following Director submissions and ensure all budgets follow MCK standards. Changes may be requested before proceeding.
- Secondary requests are discussed at an Operations Team Meeting, which consists of all Unit Directors, Associate Executive Directors and the Executive Director.
- The budgets are reviewed for pre-approval by the Finance and Operations (FAO) Committee, who make recommendations as to which Secondary Requests can be approved, if any. The FAO is made up of 3 Council Chiefs.
- Budgets are finalized at a full Council Meeting, in which all Directors must be present and able to answer questions.

HOUSING LOAN PROGRAM

IONTATHWISTANIHAS AIONTENONHSÓN:NI HOUSING LOAN PROGRAM (AVAILABLE YEAR ROUND)

If you're one of the many Kahnawakehrónon applying for funding through the MCK Revolving Loan Program this year, you have already received a letter from the Housing department advising you of changes to the current system. The goal of these changes is to make it quicker and easier to apply for a mortgage with more flexibility for the homeowner.

“Basically, instead of having the one-time-a-year call out saying loans are available, we're going to be there

on a continuous basis”, said Mike O'Brien, Director of Social Development Unit. “People will be able to come in, apply for a loan and get approved just like you would in a bank.”

In the current housing schemes A and B, amounts that can be borrowed are fixed at \$60,000 or \$82,500 with a 10% down payment. If one were to go to an outside bank, the required down payments are 25%.



On the Horizon

With the new loan program, community members will be able to determine what type and size of home they wish to build, figure how much they'll need to borrow, and then shop between banks to see who offers the best mortgage plan. O'Brien also points out that having three banks to choose from when shopping for a mortgage will benefit the home-builder, since they will have to compete for your business and hopefully,

offer more incentives.

“Between the two current MCK housing programs, the Duplex Housing Project, and the banks, we're trying to give community members as many options as possible”, stated O'Brien. “Clients will be able to get what they want, when they want it, anytime of the year.”

TEKANONHSANEKHÁNION DUPLEX DWELLING PROJECT


As recently reported on News 4 and Kwatokent Television, the Social Development Unit of the MCK recently received approval from Council to move forward with their proposed Duplex Housing Development Project. The hope is that this project will solve the current dilemmas for those seeking affordable housing. Duplexes or “semi-detached” units turned out to be the most economical option.

There are 14 duplexes planned for construction, making 28 units available for purchase. They will be built in the new development of lot 106, past the Clay Mountains. The units will be sold in the mid \$60,000 range, with zero down and mortgage payments comparable to those of the Kahnawá:ke multi-dwelling rental units.



The Duplexes will use a design similar to these units.

The duplexes would be interspersed throughout the new development lot 106 and not all clumped in one area.

Delisle has been a major factor in much of the expansion and what the MCK is today. When she began her career, she was 1 of 7 MCK employees with a budget of \$481,000. On her departure from the MCK, she leaves as 1 of close to 300 employees, with an operating budget of almost \$45 million dollars.

Delisle will be replaced by Ryan Rice, who has worked under her as a Financial Analyst and who replaced her as Director of Finance when she became an AED.

CLEAN SOIL POLICY

“We do not inherit the land from our ancestors,
we borrow it from our children.”

Construction season is here and many new home builders will be in need of clean and safe landfill for their property. The MCK's Landfill Office can answer some of the most common questions home owners may have when it comes to regulations and the newly revised Clean Soil Policy.

Brief History

Landfill guidelines for Kahnawá:ke were first developed in 1987 with amendments to the policy in 1995. The Landfill Policy has now been amended to the Clean Soil Policy. There are currently eight documented contaminated landfill sites in Kahnawá:ke due to unmonitored landfill activity in the past.

Why do we need a Clean Soil Policy in Kahnawá:ke?

To protect our health, safety and environment by avoiding contaminated soil from being brought onto the territory. The Clean Soil Policy has criteria for acceptable landfill that is current to Federal and Provincial standards. This will lower the risk of further contamination of our lands.



How can I get Landfill?

Bring proof of landholding and a lot map with specific dimensions to the Landfill or Environment Protection Office for an application and complete a request form.

Who needs a permit to Landfill?

All contractors and sub-contractors are required to get a permit. Community members do not require a permit and there is no cost for landfill to landholders.

How long does it take to get Landfill?

Once the application is processed, the Landfill Inspector evaluates the site, and with the approval of the Environment Protection Office, landholders are put on a waiting list. Landfill is subject to availability with priority given for housing or emergency repair work. It is best to apply well ahead time.

Will the Policy affect me if I'm landscaping my yard?

No. It does not affect landholders or community organizations that purchase topsoil from a reputable nursery or landscaping company. However, all organizations, including the MCK are required to follow the Clean Soil Policy.

Who has authority to inspect and suspend landfill activity?

The Director of Lands or designate, the Environment Protection Coordinator, Kahnawá:ke Peacekeepers, the Public Works Roads & Highway Department Manager, Kahnawá:ke Conservation, Health & Safety Manager, Landfill Inspector, and the Landfill Coordinator.

AIONKWATATEWEIENNENTÁ:'ON NO:NEN ENIONKWAHNE:KO FLOOD AWARENESS

The warm weather, though a pleasure when it arrives, is also for many, a home disaster if they are victims of a flood. The spring season brings large amounts of water to your yard, and sometimes into your basement.

To reduce damage to your household and belongings, make sure you are prepared for a flood. It will save you money, your home, and possibly even your life.

How to prepare for a flood:

- Keep water-proofing materials such as plywood, sandbags, and plastic sheeting.
- Purchase a sump pump and keep it plugged in at all times.
- Ensure you have a battery powered back-up sump pump in your basement in case of a power outage.
- Have a qualified plumber check your flood-proof devices (floor drains, sump pump, backwater valves.) Have the plumber explain how it works and how to use it.
- Ensure you have a family escape plan and meeting place in case you and your family get separated.
- Talk to your insurance company about flood protection.
- Install a water-level alarm.

Aside from the obvious damage by the flood, “invisible” toxins such as mold, mildew and infectious bacteria begin growing and cause allergies, bronchitis, asthma attacks and lung illnesses. Before cleaning, remove all carpet and water absorbing materials such as insulation, furniture, mattresses, etc. Ensure that you ventilate your household to dry everything.

There are many ways to clean a flood mess, and the most effective is bleach and water. For sensitive surfaces, use non-ammonia soaps (mixing with

bleach creates toxic gases). Remember to use the proper hand and eye protection when using cleaning solutions.

No matter how prepared you are for a flood, it is still disastrous to experience. Being prepared will reduce the amount of damage it will do to your home, family and finances. Prepare yourselves.

SKATEBOARD SAFETY

The Kahnawá:ke skate park will excite many skateboarders with its grand opening to be scheduled as soon as the weather clears. As a skateboarder, taking risks is the one of the only ways, besides practice, that improves your skating ability. Unfortunately it comes at a painful price; risk of injury.

To avoid severely hurting yourself, minimize your risk by following these simple rules:

- Wear a properly fitted helmet and safety pads (knee and elbow). Head injuries are the most severe injuries caused by skateboarding.
- If you fall, roll instead of stiffening your body. It will soften your fall.

- Wear wrist protectors. The first instinctive reaction is to use your hands to break your fall, and this could lead to a broken wrist.
- Always check your board before skating. If the board is cracked, or the trucks are loose, replace the parts or don't use it.
- Never skate alone, in case you are incapable of calling for help.

If it seems impossible to accomplish, it probably is. Don't risk your safety! Follow these techniques and keep yourself safe!

Remember, you are skating at **your own risk!**

THE DIRT ON COMPOSTING

Waste is the by-product of our consumer society. The impact of our wasteful habits must be managed if we wish to leave the earth fit for future generations. Composting is one easy and effective method. You don't even need any special knowledge or equipment. It takes only a little extra effort to collect your wastes, known as **browns** and **greens**, and establish an active compost pile. Once you've got it going, it just about takes care of itself.

How composting works:

In nature, organic wastes are broken down through a combination of biological and chemical processes. Biological agents like worms, insects, fungi, bacteria and other micro-organisms "chew up" the materials, which are further transformed by oxidation (exposure to air), reduction and hydrolysis (exposure to water).

For successful composting, you need:

- The right amount of water and air to keep the biological and chemical processes functioning.
- The right temperature. Ever notice how quickly things go 'bad' in warm - weather? In a sense it's 'cooking'.
- The right Carbon:Nitrogen ratio. Ideally, your C:N ratio should be thirty to one. Sawdust, straw, wood chips and dry leaves are high in carbon. Grass clippings, plant trimmings and kitchen scraps are high in nitrogen.
- What to compost: Grass clippings, leaves and twigs, flowers, old potted soil, weeds (if green and not seeded), fruit and vegetable scraps, tea bags and coffee grinds, wood ashes, sawdust and wood chips, pet hair, egg shells, manure and straw.
- The right container you should use is a compost unit.

How to get started:

You don't have to run to the composter every time you peel a potato. Many people keep their kitchen wastes under the sink in a large plastic container with a resealable lid and a handle. When the container is full, they empty it into the compost pile, thus reducing the number of trips they have to make.

Building a compost box:

Building your own composter will allow you to design a unit to suit your specific needs. A composter can be made of wood, concrete blocks, wire mesh or almost any material you have available.

The three **most** essential features in a composter are:

- 1) A lid that protects the pile from rain and snow and allows you to control how much moisture gets in.
- 2) Holes or vents to allow air circulation.
- 3) A means of removing the final product.

Make sure they have enough room to grow and are planted where they can get plenty of sunlight. By early to mid-May or after the last frost, move your seedlings and start planting your garden.

Don't forget to weed, water and mulch your garden to grow healthy plants all summer long. Go to the Environment Office to use their resources. They have plenty of information on gardening (and composting too.)

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
